#### FCS Manners 101

Please and thank you go a long way in today's society. Kids spend more time looking at their phones instead of the people with them at the dinner table. The Bell County Extension Council, FCS Advisory Council, and a local school district felt it was important to teach kids the importance of manners and how to act in different social settings, focusing on good table manners.

FCS conducted a program called Manners for the Real World to 117 middle school students at Pineville. Using UK Curriculum on etiquette, students practiced setting the table, passing the food in the right direction, knowing where to place napkins and utensils, no cell phones, and elbows off the table. 100% of students can set a table properly and intend to use good table manners going forward. 85% of students recognize when they are not using proper mealtime manners at the table.

#### 4-H Youth Development

#### 2023 4-H Camp

4-H Camp provides opportunities for youth to get out of their comfort zones, try activities they have never attempted, increase skills they already have, and make lifelong friends.

Bell County recently participated in a four day session at JM Feltner Memorial 4-H Camp in London, KY. Youth participated in fishing, swimming, archery, riflery, climbing walls. zip lines, low ropes, nature classes and several craft classes. For the second consecutive year, Bell County broke its own record by having 88 people attend 4-H Camp in 2023. 80% of campers that participated in the fishing class learned to rig a hook with live bait properly.

Several businesses and individuals donated enough money so that every camper only needed to pay \$50 (instead of the full amount of \$275) to attend camp. These donors understand the positive impact that 4-H Camp can have on young people.

#### Fire Ants in Kentucky

Fire Ants have been spreading into Kentucky since 2000 and are a significant health and agricultural concern. Ants will defend their nest, often resulting in dozens of painful stings on people and animals.

After receiving a report of fire ants from the Office of the State Entomologist, the Bell County AG Agent developed a social media campaign to warn the community of the danger and to locate possible mounds in the community. The campaign was shared over 100 times and reached multiple families. After receiving several calls, the ANR Agent visited each location to identify suspected fire ant mounds. Two mounds were identified in Middlesboro and successfully treated.

Fire ant mounds look like fluffy soil with no obvious entrance/exit hole. When the nest is disturbed, fire ants will "boil out" of the mound. This behavior is very distinctive, unlike the more common ants in Kentucky.

If you have found a suspect ant or ant mound on your property or public land, please report it to the county extension office.

### **Nutrition Education**

#### Using Wild Game Meat to Help with Food Insecurity

Food insecurity is a reality for many in Eastern Kentucky. Research showed that the food-insecure population in Bell County was 4,830, or 19.6% in 2021. To address this, the University of Kentucky Nutrition Education Program Assistant in Bell County partnered with Cooperative Extension Agents to introduce a new program called Cook Wild Kentucky, which was developed by UK and many partners. Using the state's popular wild game recipes, families learned how to prepare wild game, regulations, safe harvest, and proper food handling. This program increased the knowledge and skills of participants that hunt or receive wild game from food banks, helping them to use this valuable protein source and reduce food waste. There were 14 attendees that participated in this program. 90% of the participants saved on their food budget because of this program.

One participant stated, "I am so thankful for this program. I have learned so much. I'm excited to cook our harvest now that I have recipes to use.
